We have had a busy term with trips out and visitors to school.

Early Years have enjoyed welcoming many visitors into their classrooms this half term. The Nursery children loved the visit from the Tynemouth Sea Rescue and the police, whilst Reception enjoyed hearing about what it was like to grow up in the past from our visiting grandparents. The children in Reception and Nursery have been learning about all the people in the community who help us. I was lucky enough to be invited to join our children in Reception on their trip to Cramlington Library. Whilst they were out, Nursery took advantage of their empty classrooms for some early transition activities.

The children in Reception absolutely love the sessions they have with their Year 5 reading buddies as do the Year 5 children!

Hopefully, the weather will improve so that the EYFS outdoor areas can be developed. I know that the team need some resources and are hoping for some donations of compost, plants, seeds, artificial grass and flowers or time. KS1 have thoroughly enjoyed their outdoor learning at forest school. They have made wooden necklaces, birdseed, created their own nature art pictures, as well as den building and making their own flatbreads which they enjoyed eating by the fire.

UKS2 recently participated in the Step into the NHS day. The focus was on discovering all of the different career opportunities within the NHS and the impact that different jobs can have on people. Highlights included hearing people talk about their real-life jobs such as a clinical scientist and a children's physiotherapist.

UKS2 responded well to sessions delivered by Northumbria Police about staying safe on social media. We looked at age restrictions on apps, what is safe to share and digital footprints.

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
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Throughout school, children participate in Lego League. Using Lego kits, children develop coding skills, project management and associated team skills. This term the children have explored how people can take part in the arts and share what they love to do with others. They have learnt about the different places people go to too be entertained and have used the STEAM Park kits and Master Piece discover sets to build stages and props used at concerts, theatres and museums. They have thought about the people behind the scenes who help make things happen and considered what an audience might need so that they enjoy the performance. They have tested and improved their designs and creations and shared their ideas with their peers.

All of Year 5 were invited to compete in the challenge division of LEGO league at the Village Hotel on Wednesday 15th March. Our teams of experts presented an arts- related energy problem and solution to a panel of adults. They presented their innovative robots, competed at the games table with their coded robots and behaved impeccably, constantly demonstrating the LEGO core values.

Sporting News

During the Spring term, three teams have represented the school in different sporting areas. In football, our Year 6 teams have had a very successful season, so far. The Year 6 boys' team has represented the school in the Cramlington and Seaton Valley 7 a-side and 9 a-side leagues. They are unbeaten in all games so far and sit proudly at the top of their leagues. Our girls' team also competed in the Cramlington and Seaton Valley 7 a-side league and are also unbeaten! Both teams have displayed all of our school values in each game. They have demonstrated resilience, ambition, determination and an excellent teamwork ethic. Both teams still have more fixtures to play in the summer term and we wish them continued success.

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

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
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Please remind your child that their P.E kit should be a pair of plain block joggers and a plain white tee-shirt (without logos). No football kits please.

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
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Medicines in school

I know a number of children suffer from hay fever and may get more headaches in the summer months. In some cases, school can administer over the counter medication for selflimiting conditions, which do not require any medical advice or treatment. The usual agreement forms would need to be completed as is the case for the administration of prescribed medication.

Any medication must be in its original packaging from the manufacturer and include the name of the medicine and the recommended dosage range. It must be in date and the agreed dosage on the agreement form must match that on the packaging.

If required, we are able to administer Calpol in school. We would always call you to discuss.
